Magic Flutes & Enchanted Forests: The Supernatural in Eighteenth-Century Musical Theater by David J. Buch. Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2008.

Buch's work is an important addition to the canon of books about fairy tales and their manifestation in theater and musical dramas. The last chapter deals with supernatural elements in *The Magic Flute* and *Don Giovanni*. Buch discusses the good and evil characters, uses of magic and magical objects, and the role of the fairy tale as a commentary on society. Buch also provides a detailed analysis of the score to support his theories of how otherworldly elements are represented in Mozart's music.

Mozart and His Operas by David Cairns. Berkeley: University of California Press, 2006. Cairns's unique biography traces Mozart's life and creative output through his operas. Cairns discusses how Mozart matures as an artist with each opera and writes about how his strength as a composer of great theater influences his instrumental works as well, particularly his piano concertos and string quartets. The chapter that highlights *The Magic Flute* describes Mozart's desire to fully express his love of Viennese popular theater by creating a theatrical work in German that is both funny and serious. Cairns also discusses how the opera serves as a vehicle to communicate Mozart's spiritual beliefs as a Freemason.

# The Magic Flute

Music by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, 1756–1791 Libretto by Emanuel Schikaneder, 1751–1812

The Magic Flute Unveiled: Esoteric Symbolism in Mozart's Masonic Opera: An Interpretation of the Libretto and the Music by Jacques Chailley. Rochester, VT: Inner Traditions International, 1992.

Chailley's work presents the argument that Mozart's penultimate opera is essentially a Masonic ritual set to music. He first provides a background of the creation of the work, including information about Freemasonry in eighteenth-century Vienna. The latter two sections of the book detail the Masonic elements revealed in the libretto, the characters, and the music.

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart: A Biography by Piero Melograni. Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2007.

Written during the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary year of Mozart's death, Melograni's biography is a wonderful addition to the many volumes written about the composer. Instead of in-depth musical analyses, Melograni weaves texts of Mozart's letters throughout his narrative to create a thoroughly enjoyable account of the artist's life. This biography is a great read for the music lover or novice.

Mozart: The Man Revealed by John Suchet. New York: Pegasus Books, 2017.

John Suchet presents Classic FM's flagship morning program in England but his career as a television journalist serves him well as the author of this biography. Suchet's warm and witty style creates an enjoyable portrait of the man as well as the composer. A perfect biography to introduce someone to Mozart and his works. ML410.M9 S92 2017x

### The Rose Elf

Music and Libretto by David Hertzberg, 1990-

Based on the fairy tale *The Elf of the Rose* by Hans Christian Andersen, *The Rose Elf* takes you to a world where a tiny elf lives happily and contently in the protective petals of a beautiful rose. When the flower closes one night before the Elf returns home, the Elf seeks shelter in some nearby honeysuckle. There, the Elf overhears the Girl and her Beloved exchange tender goodbyes, as the Beloved prepares for a lengthy journey. After the Beloved embarks, the Elf watches in horror as the Brother brutally murders the Beloved and buries him beneath a linden tree. The Elf whispers the truth to the Girl while she sleeps, leaving her a leaf from the linden tree to convince her that his message was not a dream. When she awakens, the Girl pursues the terrible truth, even though it could destroy her.

Developed through Opera Philadelphia's <u>Double Exposure</u> program in 2016 and 2018, *The Rose Elf* premiered on June 6, 2018 in the catacombs of Green-Wood Cemetery in Brooklyn, in a production by <u>R.B. Schlather</u>.

### In a Grove

Music by Christopher Cerrone, 1984– Libretto by Stephanie Fleischmann, 1962–

Pittsburgh Opera will present the world premiere of *In a Grove*, a one act chamber opera in English, based on the short story by Ryūnosuke Akutagawa.

*In a Grove* is a meditation on subjectivity, innocence, empathy, and guilt, presenting the narrative of a fatal crime in the testimony of several witnesses whose differing stories make the truth impossible to discern.

Four singers play eight roles, each assuming the character of both witness and participant in the crime. Six instrumentalists also function as characters, each in concert with a different testimonial. Dispersed throughout the space and accompanied by electronics throughout, the instruments form the architecture of this world. As the testimonies unfold, singers and players shift the sonic terrain and the audience's relationship to the drama.

Music by Georges Bizet, 1838–1875 Libretto by Henri Meilhac, 1830–1897 and Ludovic Halévy, 1834–1908

### For further reading

Bizet and His World by Mina Kirsten Curtiss. New York: Knopf, 1958.

Curtiss' biography is one of the most complete biographical sketches of Bizet, even after the first appearance of this work over 50 years ago. With the help of Bizet's family and friends, including the son of Ludovic Halévy, one of the librettists for *Carmen*, Curtiss incorporates personal remembrances, Bizet's letters, and other archival material to create her portrait. The final section of the book is solely dedicated to *Carmen*. ML410.B62 C87

Georges Bizet: His Life and Work by Winton Dean. London: J. M. Dent, 1965.

This biography is a revision of Dean's 1948 work. Acknowledging Curtiss' book, he rewrote many sections of the earlier edition. Dean's focus is on the music rather than Bizet's life and he delves deeply into the libretto and musical motifs of *Carmen*. He also talks about the never-ending controversy of using the spoken dialogue versus the recitatives composed by Ernest Guiraud after Bizet's death. ML410.B62 D355

Georges Bizet, Carmen by Susan McClary. Cambridge; New York: Cambridge University Press, 1992.

Part of the Cambridge Opera Handbooks series. The essays allow the reader to dive into various aspects of this work. One essay highlights the original story by Prosper Mérimée, which first appeared in a French travel journal while another discusses race, class, and gender issues of nineteenth-century France. Bizet's musical language is discussed and analyzed, and a final essay talks about film versions depicting this famous temptress. ML410.B62 M25 1992

Georges Bizet: A Biography by Christoph Schwandt. Lanham, Maryland: Scarecrow Press, 2013.

Schwandt's biography is widely accepted as a definitive work. The author argues for Bizet's place among the composers of his time. His life's work is not just *Carmen*, as wonderful as the opera may be. Schwandt writes about Bizet's musical output and sheds light on the man behind some amazing music.

### Blue

Music by Jeanine Tesori, 1961– Libretto by Tazewell Thompson, 1948–

*Blue* is a 2019 opera by Tony Award winning composer Jeanine Tesori and NAACP Theatre Award winning librettist Tazewell Thompson.

Blue is inspired by contemporary events and Black literature, including Ta-Nehisi Coates' Between the World and Me and James Baldwin's The Fire Next Time. Librettist Tazewell Thompson tells the story of a black family struck by tragedy. A police officer is torn apart when his son is killed at a protest by another officer.

Blue was commissioned by The Glimmerglass Festival and premiered July 14, 2019. Blue received the Music Critics Association of North America 2020 Award for Best New Opera
